

From Pastor Gary Kinkel...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Easter draws near. During Holy Week we will recall and worship our way inside the climax of Jesus' Galilean and Judean ministries. The services and readings will remind us of the world's response to Jesus, to his way and his call. The powerful in both government and religion moved decisively and brutally against him. He was arrested, tortured, tried and crucified—a death reserved for political criminals against Rome. We are called to think deeply about what it means to believe and say that he was crucified for us [pro nobis]. What does it mean to say he died for me [pro me]? How does this death fit into God's work in and for the world? The New Testament has a good deal to say about these matters and it is there that we must seek the answers.

On the third day he destroyed the power of death. Death could not hold Jesus. God raised him up from the dust into which the powers of sin, death and the devil had crushed him. God shattered the power of these powers and brought Jesus out from the cold tomb, exalted him and gave him the Name above every Name so that every knee should bow before him for the glory of God the Father (Phil. 2:9-11). Jesus is the Lord and Master of all things. He lives and he reigns over the universe. His way is God's way. This is the heart, the living core, the blazing fire at the center of the New Testament.

A convicted criminal was being led out to be hanged in 19th century England. A Church of England priest was telling him about these things, urging him to repent and cast himself on the mercy of the Savior before his final moment. The felon stopped in his tracks and said to the cleric, "Mister, if I believed all that about Jesus was the truth, I would crawl across England on broken glass to make sure that every person understood it."

There are some key questions to keep before our minds. Do you really believe "all that about Jesus" is the truth? How does that gain traction in your life? How does your way of living reflect and point to the truth about Jesus? If Jesus is the Lord and Master of all things, reigning in the universe, alive, present and available to you, how closely to him do you live? If you say you belong to him, do you share his sufferings (an important New Testament theme)? If you say you belong to him, does your giving match that confession; does your giving reveal that all you are and all you have belongs to him? If you say you believe "all that" about him, do you join the public gathering for worship, at which his Word is set forth? It is all too easy for our claim to belong to him, to love him, to follow him to be nothing more than pretty words that have no reality. They acquire reality when we begin to serve, to do the things that he says, to give all that we can for his cause and mission, to love with his love and to treat others with his grace. And that requires growth through regular engagement with him by hearing his Word preached.

I look forward to seeing you this Sunday.

A Note from the Treasurer on Discipleship at St. John's

Brothers and sisters in Christ we live in changing times. As we move along the timeline in early 21st century America, our society's values, beliefs, and priorities are evolving into something different. These changes are having a direct effect on the Church of God in America. As our lives become more consumed with the world around us, it seems God's Church has become less of a priority for many. But we must not forget that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is an unchanging message of hope to every generation and is the center of the church's mission in making Disciples of Christ regardless of the cultural changes going on around us.

Scripture teaches us that a church is a body of believers who follow Jesus Christ. Jesus taught us to love one another, to treat others as we want to be treated, to love our enemies, to remember the poor and to be humble servants like he was. Above all of these he wants us to seek him with all our heart, soul, and mind. His life on earth was his example to us on how we ought to be.

How then does that apply to St. John's? If we take Jesus' teachings to heart, then we should desire to take full advantage of all that our church offers. The celebration of God's grace and sacrifice should be something we look forward to every Sunday morning as it gives us the opportunity and blessing to seek him through worship and praise, the sacraments, and through God's spoken word. This time gives us the opportunity to serve others through helping in the preparation, execution, and cleanup of the service. It's also an opportunity to show our gratitude by giving back some of what God has given us so that the church may function.

And as members of this body we have the opportunity, both in and out of Sunday services, to love one another, to be friends with one another, to be supportive of one another, and to be literal friends of Christ as he described in the Gospel of John. I believe Jesus desires us to be a unified and socially connected outward looking group of friends that is centered on Christ and his mission and not inwardly focused on ourselves like the current cultural changes are pushing us to do.

I believe the St. John's body of Christ as a whole has earned the title of 'friend' for each of us. But I now must painfully tell you that this friend is currently in great need. Our church is suffering from neglect that we all have a part in. Our drop off in attendance, in serving, and giving has taken a toll. At our annual meeting in January the congregation approved the 2019 budget which relies on a 10% increase in giving over 2018. Not only did we not have this increase for the first two months of 2019, we saw our giving for this period down close to 38% from the expected level needed to sustain the approved budget. If this does not improve soon, painful choices will need to be made.

So, I am pleading with every member to please pray for your friend St. John's. Pray that God will open our hearts and minds to what he is doing and for the strength and faith to follow him in the direction he wants us to go. Pray that we might rely on God to provide the resources needed to fulfill his plan. Pray that God will show you how you personally may help in any of the areas of need. And finally, please pray that St. John's Lutheran Church will Rise Up and Be Renewed by the living God so that we may continue our long history of generosity and of carrying out Christ's mission for years to come.

II. Discernment (New Business)

- A. Beacon/Families Moving Forward Debra Rogers with Beacon Interfaith Housing Collaborative gave an overview of the program which offers families experiencing homelessness hospitality, emergency shelter and support for stability. Beacon is a collaboration of currently 80 congregations committed to making sure people have a home. The Council unanimously agreed that St. John's will partner with Cross of Peace to aid in this effort. Cross of Peace staff provides training for volunteers. The next hosting week is in May.
- B. Sound board operator Sandy McCullough suggests that this become a volunteer position filled by a team of at least 4 volunteers. This position was included in the budget at \$1,000. Altar Guild need to build a group of volunteers to perform several duties including recording the service.

Motion to pay Mark McGraw \$1,000 now and \$1,000 when a volunteer group is identified. Pastor Gary Kinkel.

Motion amended to pay only \$1,000 in order to stay within budget and identify volunteers. Jim Hime; defeated

Motion to pay \$500 now and \$500 when volunteers are identified, covering 6 months, Jan. 27 – July 28. Aimee Johnson; defeated

Motion to pay \$1,000 the last Sunday in July. Pastor Jerod Freeberg/Jim Hime

Motion amended to pay Mark McGraw \$1,000 either following the last Sunday in July or when volunteers have been established to take his place. Sandy McCullough, President/Aimee Johnson; carried.
