From Pastor Gary Kinkel...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

"What's new at St. John's?" people sometimes ask me. What I WANT to say is, "Absolutely nothing!" That doesn't mean we should not try new things at church. It does not mean I find change problematic. Indeed, sometimes change is necessary for life. As Bob Dylan sang:

The hollow horn plays wasted words proves to warn that he not busy being born is busy dying.

Dylan is not wrong. And yet, what is to change and how, precisely? These are the two key questions. What needs to change and in what ways do we need to be busy being born? We tend to identify institutions and structures, public statements and official stances as the things that need to be changed. And sometimes that is true. Sometimes. But if you look carefully at what Jesus says and does and listen closely to what Paul wrote, you will see that the primary emphasis tends to fall somewhere else. We absolutely have to pray and think hard about how to be faithfully Christian in our public life, in our political engagement (which includes our voting), in our economic and financial behavior, and so on. These areas of life are spheres in which God calls us to exercise our faith and practice our obedience. BUT...But...

The New Testament points in a different direction. Now, we have to be careful, because sometimes this New Testament direction is taken by some kinds of Christians to mean that we need not worry about whether our political judgments, our social ethical views, etc. are faithfully reflective of and obedient to Jesus, our Savior. They do matter. Every detail of life matters to the living God. But the emphasis in the New Testament is that WE need to be changed. I myself, and you yourself, need to be transformed; need to become new and different than we are now. What is at stake every Sunday is salvation and damnation and whether I will leave as a different person than the one who entered; whether I will leave more stamped, embossed, with the form of Jesus Christ and look, think and act more like him and less like the self I used to be.

Ironically, in order for me to be transformed in the proper ways, the ways that are most faithfully Christian, there are things that must not be changed. One important feature of Christian worship, one of its key purposes, is to remold and reshape us. It is to teach us to pray and to direct all things to God. Christian worship does this by NOT entertaining us. Rather, there need to be certain things that do not change so that their repetition forms our minds and hearts in a habit. We NEED the liturgy and we NEED the ancient prayers of the church to form us in the right habits that make Christians Christian. Repetition and habit have a profound power to shape our ways of thinking, feeling and acting.

Moreover, we live in a society that does not help us to hear the Gospel or to live faithfully as Christians. Every day, in every waking moment, our society hammers us with its message that God does not matter, that public worship is a trivial thing (and so, it does not matter whether I go or not), that Jesus, salvation and faithfulness are quaint but silly, that self-sacrificing love is weak or masochistic, etc. In other words, the world shapes and forms us every day in every waking moment in ways contrary to the Gospel. But on Sunday morning we gather for DIFFERENCE, to do something very different. We need to be clear that we are doing something different and that we mean to be transformed, to be different from, the society that surrounds us. And we need some time in order to do that. We need to be jarred by the difference, so we need music and ways of doing things that are quite different from our everyday songs and language. And the first, and primary difference, is that we are not in charge here. We are not in control and we are not the central focus. This congregation and the time we spend together at St. John's belong to God for God's purposes...not ours. Here, let us adopt Martin Luther's call as one of our watchwords: "Let God be God!" See you Sunday!

"Prayer is an awesomely powerful, fiery reality, if one prays in love. Since if love for God burns fervently, and if one receives God with inward love, that produces true childlike prayer and such a person gains that for which they pray...The more fervent the love for God, the more powerful the prayer. Wherefore, the primary things for which we have to pray are for the increase of faith and for an overflowing abundance of love for God. It is an especially comforting promise of God that he has poured his love into our hearts through the Holy Spirit. (Romans 5:5)"

- 1. Where was Abram living when God called him to leave everything he knew and head out on the road?
- 2. Who was the last "Judge" of biblical Israel?

- 4. In the first chapter of his book, what so deeply troubled the prophet Habakkuk? (Note, it comes into sharp focus in 1:13)
- 5. In chapter 11 of the Gospel of Mark, following the "cleansing" of the temple a symbolic prophecy of its destruction and end, Peter pointed to the fig tree Jesus had similarly spoken a word against. The tree has withered by Jesus' word. What Peter says implies a question: If not the temple, then what? What thing, what structure, what practices take the place of the temple? Where and how is worship of the One God centered? Jesus answered in Mark 11:22-25 by placing **three things** where the temple with its rituals and sacrifices had been in the people's faith practice. What are they?


The change was made based of the need to make re-look at our Sunday school program. We started researching options for changing up the programing in the spring after noticing a decline in the attendance and family involvement in worship services. We surveyed the Sunday school families regarding different times and days for Sunday school. The education committee after reviewing the surveys and parent comments proposed the following:

The Sunday school kids will join us for worship at the 10:00 am service and after the children's sermon, they disperse to their Sunday School rooms for music time, classroom time and fellowship. Sunday school will end at 11:15 with the congregation joining us downstairs in the fellowship hall for donuts and coffee.

As mentioned earlier the proposal passed at the July council meeting.

We are aware that many important activities besides Sunday school will be affected by this change and pray that all of you will be open to this change understanding that this is going to be a trial that may need to be adjusted throughout the year.

- B. Motion to approve agenda: Pastor Gary Kinkel/Jim Hime; carried.

II. Discernment (New Business)

- A. Open Council position with the resignation of Scott Wilts.
- B. The Council discussed a capital campaign for repairs to the building and missions.
 - The pilot light on the stove in the kitchen does not work properly and a new boiler will be needed. The State of MN is offering rebates for the installation of rooftop solar panels, and there may be grants available as well. Grants may also be available through the ELCA for replacing lights with LEDs.
 - Mike Sexton requested an electrician look at the following items: Worship area fans rheostat, Mechanical timer for the outdoor lighting, Light switches on the East wall in the social area
 - Motion to advise Mike Sexton to coordinate bids for estimates for the electrical repairs to the building: Jenny Pudwill/Pastor Gary Kinkel; carried.

- E. Update on electrical: Sandy McCullough Mike Sexton met with an electrician who quoted \$947 for the 3 items needing attention. \$450 is replacing outdoor LED lights. Mike will be seeking at least one other bid.

 - St. John's raised \$300 in one Sunday to send bibles to Tanzania.
 - A digital SLR camera was donated anonymously by a St. John's member, including a gift receipt.
 - The mission trip was wonderful! Gardening, yard work, raking and mulching, made an incredible impact in Williamsburg, NY. The experience made a significant impact in the lives of the 4 students who attended the mission trip.

 - The electrical repairs are in progress.
 - Replacement of the wiring in the old part of the church is currently not necessary.
 - New lighting in the sanctuary is over halfway done.
 - Gift of digital SLR camera.

- B. Proposed use of excess funds: Sandy McCullough proposed mission work, giving a payment to the synod, and having an emergency fund for people who may be seeking help.
