### From Pastor Gary Kinkel...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

We live in a troubling time--a turbulent age in which much that we thought was settled and behind us has once again asserted itself. Much that we once knew has been forgotten. We have forgotten that every human being has an inherent dignity and eternal value because they have been created by God, are loved by God, and each one is someone for whom Jesus Christ died (and it makes no difference whether they know or believe that—it is still true).

We have forgotten that God has made of ONE blood all the peoples of the earth and that our perceived differences are merely external and cosmetic or matters of custom and culture.

We have forgotten that when income and power are increasingly in the hands of a few at the expense of most of the rest of the people, the consequences are eventually, and inevitably, tragic (think, for example, of the peasant's revolt that happened in Luther's day).

We have forgotten that it was unions and collective bargaining that brought an end to slave wages and to workers being enslaved to companies (quite literally), that it was unions that gave us the 40-hour work week, the minimum wage, paid vacation and child leave, employer provided health insurance and regular cost of living increases.

We have forgotten that if one person's rights and one person's citizenship can be ignored or erased, then anyone's can.

We have forgotten that borders do not come from God and that God gives no evidence of concern about them (attempts by some Christians to use a couple of isolated Old Testament passages to "prove" God's concern for borders are labored, tendentious and totally unconvincing). Borders are an utterly human, and arbitrary, creation, "defended" for utterly human and self-interested reasons.

We have forgotten, from the highest to the lowest levels of our society, that Jesus calls us, no, COMMANDS US, to treat others (ALL others) exactly as we would want to be treated—to say and do to others exactly what we want others to say and do to us (Matthew 7:12 and Luke 6:31).

And we have forgotten that Jesus calls his followers to "deny ourselves" (see Matthew 16:24, Mark 8:34 and Luke 9:23), which means to deny my self-will, give up my way and my desires—take up a cross and go with Jesus in HIS way. I cannot deny myself, die to myself, and at the same time make myself the center of my concern and seek my own good first. These two things are contradictory. Therefore, I also cannot support or identify myself with any attempt to make my group...or my nation...the first and foremost consideration and make everyone and everything else secondary.

In the church, we have largely forgotten what the church is and what it is supposed to be about. We give our attention, our time and our energy to matters that are secondary. We fight about things that ultimately do not matter. Meanwhile, the truth, the revelation of God, the Presence and the Power which is always and everywhere available, the eternal, deep wisdom of Jesus and his way, the redemption that sets sinners free and raises the dead beckons but is not looked into, or is only skimmed along the surface.

Moreover, we have forgotten that we are called to love each other—especially when we disagree—and to have the same mind among us that was in Christ Jesus when he humbled himself, took on the form of a slave and went all the way down into death for us (Philippians 2:4-8).

We gather every Sunday to remember; to be reminded; to be reoriented away from ourselves and toward the Power and the Glory whose name is Father, Son and Dear Mother the Spirit. Please join us and remember that starting September 15 we return to two services each Sunday, but at slightly different times. Our two services will be at 8:00 and 10:00 am. *See you for worship!*

### Answers to last month's questions:

- 1. In the city of Ur, among the "Chaldeans." (Genesis 11:31) This is in the region of Mesopotamia (the land between the Tigris and Euphrates rivers.)
- Samuel was the last of Israel's "judges." He anointed Saul to be Israel's first king (1 Samuel 10:17-27).
- 3. The task the Lord gave to Isaiah was to speak the Lord's message, to announce the Word of the Lord, but to be met by a failure to understand, right up until the day judgment would fall (Isaiah 6:9-13).
- 4. What troubles Habakkuk to the core of his being is that the Lord is too pure to look on evil, and yet God seems to remain silent while wickedness and violence multiplies (Habakkuk 1:1-4, 13).
- 5. The three realities that replace the temple in Mark 11 are: a) Faith in God; b) Prayer; and c) Forgiveness.

- 1. Why did the Lord refuse to allow David to build a temple to worship and honor the Lord? (See 1 Chronicles 22:8 and 1 Chronicles 28:3)
- From what source does the apostle Paul say he received the message that he preaches? (See Galatians)
- 3. Is Jesus careful to obey the law? (see Mark 2:23-28, or Mark 3:1-6, and these are only two of many examples).
- 4. What is the higher thing that causes Jesus to be rather loose toward the law? (See Matthew 12:11-14 or Matthew 12:6-7).
- 5. What tribe in Israel does Ruth come from? (Read the book of Ruth)
