

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Grace to you and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ! 2020 has been a trying year for all of us! As we approach the first Sunday of Advent, which is the first Sunday of the Church's new year, we look back and we look forward at the same time. We look back on challenges and on things that have been hard, both in our personal lives and for the Church. But, in the midst of all the difficulties brought on by the pandemic, by the deep, emotional political and social divisions among us, by the trauma some of us have experienced, there have been good things, too. Kay and I have delighted in the continued growth of our grandchildren and in their sheer joy in being alive. Indeed, in the teeth of the pandemic, we welcomed a new little grandson, William. I am sure you can name things, too, for which you have been deeply thankful in the past year. And though there has been sadness and grief, we look forward to better things in the coming year. But Advent reminds us to look back and look ahead in a different way, too. Advent calls us to place our lives in a much bigger context; to think of what our lives mean and what we are about as part of a much bigger story than just our immediate happiness or pain.



Advent reminds us that we are part of God's story with the world. In one sense it reaches back to the reality and meaning of the creation of the world, and our creation. It reminds us that there has been a tragic and disastrous interruption in God's good creation: we have sinned and chosen rebellion against God and against God's good ways for us. We have willed to be God in God's place. We have sought other goals and other goods than those God wills for us. And Advent reminds us that God intervened in this ongoing tragedy and trauma. God took on our every flesh and shared our life, in every way like us, except that he was without sin. He came to do his Father's will in every respect. God came, "deep in the flesh" of Jesus of Nazareth, to take into his own body our sin and corruption; to let healing flow from his wounds, cleansing us with his own blood, being broken so that we might be healed and dying a horrifying and tormented death so that the power of death might be broken for us.

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He was raised in order to bring us along into his victory over sin, the devil and death; so that we might be translated from the darkness of our hearts and of the corrupted world shaped by the spirit of Cain, to his glorious and uncorrupted light. Advent is meant to recall all of this past for us and to make it present. With each detail about Jesus, we should always add, "For us."

But Advent calls us to look to the future, too. And not just the coming year, or the coming decade, but rather to be mindful of the far-flung future of God's consummation of the creation. Advent urges us to look forward to the final healing of the world, which is worn down by a pandemic far worse in both extent and effect than COVID-19. Advent reminds us that we who live by faith in Jesus Christ need not fear health restrictions, election outcomes, or even death! In Jesus Christ, in the end of all things, all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well! "He comes to make, his blessings flow...!" The dead in Christ shall be raised! If we have shared his suffering, and died a death like his, we believe we shall also live with him (see Romans 6). Death, you have no more power here! Sin, your damage is not eternal. God has begun in Christ to make an end of you! Devil, howl and rage as you will, we will not be afraid, because Jesus has made a mockery of you in his resurrection! (see Colossians 2) Advent reminds us to live in the present, even in the midst of challenges, even faced with griefs, even when we experience the assault of sin and evil and death, in the knowledge of the victory of God in Jesus Christ! We are to remember that he, Jesus, is the head of every power and authority, and he has the last Word on every feature of reality! Just as we received Jesus, then, as God's anointed, as the Christ, let us keep living a life deeply rooted in him, united with him, built up and confirmed in faith in him. (Colossians 2) We have died and our true life is hidden with Christ in God. When he appears, and he is our life, then we shall appear with him in glory. (Colossians 3).

That's what Advent is all about, Charlie Brown. Looking backward and forward at the big picture of God's story of creation, redemption and consummation and finding, seeing, our place in it.

A blessed Advent and a merry Christmas to each and every one of you!
