### From Pastor Gary Kinkel...

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

The secular year begins this month. But for the Church the new year began on the First Sunday of Advent. For us, we are in the second month of the new year. There is something important here, something worthy of attention and reflection.

The gathering of people who belong to Jesus Christ are not quite in step with the world; not quite in sync with the society in which we live. We march to our own drum, follow our own marching orders and are bound to our own Leader and Savior. The rhythms of the drum to which we listen and our marching orders, the path we walk together, are given to us by God through Jesus Christ. The measure of what we do and say, of the things we seek, is, first and foremost, the cross of Jesus. Because he is raised from death by God, we must unrelentingly ask: does something fit with the grace, vulnerability, humility and mercy revealed to us, given to us, by God in this event.

In the early decades of the Christian movement it was easy to see the difference between the convictions and ways of living of Jesus-followers and those not following Jesus. For a variety of reasons, the society around those early Jesus worshipers was largely hostile to them. And they had to be resolute and clear in order to maintain their faithfulness to the God of Israel revealed as Savior from sin and death in Jesus. They had to, in many instances, openly refuse to participate in public observances and rites, because these embodied convictions, practices or allegiances which would have made those early Christians into blasphemers. The overriding assumption in the New Testament is that the Christian faithful are a small, persecuted minority. But as centuries wore on, those Christ-folk became numerous. Eventually, Christianity became the official Imperial Religion (though from the first days of that shift there were Christian teachers who believed and taught that this move was disastrous for the faith and for the Church).

In the Middle Ages, all of western society—and also the eastern Roman Empire—was built around the Christian Church and Christian convictions and teaching. Again, there it is highly questionable whether that was ever a good thing—and there are good reasons to think that it was not. In any case, Christians came to think of their faith, their Church and their society as one seamless reality. This mindset became fixed in the minds of Christians. Even after it was obviously no longer true, Christians continued to think and act as though it was true. And it became very difficult for Christians, who generally assumed that their surrounding society worked on the basis of Christian assumptions and reflected Christian "values," meanings and actions,

to see the difference between themselves and their fellow non-Christian citizens; or the difference between their convictions and practices and the goals and practices of the society at large.

Things for us are much more like they were for the earliest Christians. The society in which we live is mostly indifferent to, in some respects is openly hostile to, and in many ways finds laughable (without disciplined argument or investigation and study) our convictions and ways of life. The vast majority of intellectual life around us, of art and literature, of the operation of the levers of political power, of the public goals that are held out for us to pursue, of our self-understandings, and on and on take place without reference to actual Christian faith and Christian teaching. Large portions of the Church have given in to this and seek to be like the society that surrounds us. They often simply mirror the "values" and convictions of the world, dressed up, of course, in Christian sounding language and "supported" by biblical quotes (badly used or badly interpreted).

The Christian Church is in crisis at present in the western world, not because of shrinking attendance or shrinking membership, but because we have forgotten that we are called to be in the world, but not OF it (see John 17). We have forgotten the difference to which we are called. We have swallowed too much of the witches' brew of the world's seductive ways, priorities, ideas and commitments. We have identified as good what the world tells us is good and have quietly assumed that Jesus is on board with that.

We are called to be a people formed by a distinctive story, different from the story that forms the western world or America. We are called to be formed from the ground up by the big story of the Scriptures interpreted through the lens of the life. suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth and to give our allegiance to this different Lord. It is Jesus Christ who has redeemed us and it is to his voice that we are to listen, his voice we are to obey, in life and in death, no matter the consequences.
